There has been a changeover of Presidency and the inclusion of new members since last year. Kaye Murphy has moved on but not before making an enormous contribution to CIKA over a period of approximately 10 years. For that, the current members of CIKA are extremely appreciative and wish Kaye all the very best in her new endeavours.

CIKA raised \$63,771.90 over the past twelve months of which \$36,986 was attributed to our annual Dinner Dance. Heather and Kevin Dixon, owners of Cosmetries of Richmond were extremely supportive of our Dinner Dance and we realize that the amount raised would have been significantly less if not for their generosity.

We have a number of very loyal supporters in the community to help us achieve these figures each year and of course help find cures for many of the solid tumours that our kids suffer. The Macedon Ranges Focus group has donated \$4,682 from their fun-filled activities and a massive \$20,000 since 1997. The ladies from Nhill lead by Gwen Mulhallen donated \$965.25. Austrade have again supported us to the value of \$700 and the Thomastown Italian Community were able to donate \$5000 from their very successful fundraiser. We also conducted a second hand bookstall at RCH, which raised \$950. Our sister parent support group FIRST@RCH (Families In Response to Solid Tumours) has been involved with the Cancer Council Victoria and the department of Paediatric Haematology and Oncology in setting up Parent Cancer Connect which is a peer support service that puts parents in touch with other parents whose children have had similar cancer experience.

Our newsletter has further developed with the expertise of AXA and to them we extend our thanks.

The Vaccine trials for Neuroblastoma, which begun in 1999, are continuing and there has been lots learnt from the trial especially on timing for giving the vaccine and the associated immune responses. Diagnostic tests are carried out to locate circulating cancer cells through blood testing. These tests are now so sensitive that abnormal cells are located before the patient experiences any symptoms.

There have been many donations received over the past twelve months and only a few mentioned but CIKA members are extremely grateful for each and every one of them. Many thanks to Sue, Helen and Rose from the Auxiliaries Office for their support and lastly a big thank you to the Committee for their assistance throughout the year. Our gratitude goes out to all of our supporters for without them CIKA would not be able to continue contributing to the research into cancer treatment at "the Kids".



Dinner Dance Speech

We have printed the speech made by Vice president Ellen Webb at our annual Cika Dinner Dance held in August. Please Take the time to read and reflect on this article as it speaks on behalf of all the cika committee.

Good evening. On behalf of the committee and members of CIKA I thank you all for coming tonight. I'd like to introduce the other elected officers of CIKA, Sandra Lehrer – President, David Webb – Treasurer and Bernie Dawson – Secretary. CIKA is an auxiliary of the Royal Children's Hospital; our members are the families and friends of children with solid tumors. These tumors include Ewings Sarcoma, Neuroblastoma, Osteosarcoma, Wilms tumor and retinoblastoma.



Our children are at different stages of their fight against cancer. Some have beaten the disease itself but now have ongoing severe health problems. Some have won their fight and, thankfully have minimal long-term impact. Some of our children have lost their fight leaving us to fight on in their memory. Others are in remission and are hoping and praying to one day hear that they've been cured.

Tonight's theme is masquerade, which I believe, is very appropriate as we try to unmask the causes of cancer, to reveal the cure and to lift the veil on the ways that solid tumors disguise themselves. We, the parents and friends of children with solid tumors are their advocates. We see to ensure that all children with solid tumors receive the best possible care. In order for children to receive the best care it is imperative that we can continue to support research.

CIKA's funding supports innovative vaccine studies for children who have relapsed. CIKA also supports molecular diagnostic studies. The research is critical as it helps the doctors determine the diagnosis quicker and ensure the appropriate course of treatment is administered. With the money raised from your generous donations and enthusiastic support we hope to be able to fund more research with the Children's Cancer Centre at the Royal Children's Hospital.

As we are a parent run charity every dollar raised goes directly to support our aims; we have no overheads.

We thank you for coming and hope you enjoy the evening – we also hope to raise pots of money! The flowerpots on your table were painted by the children. We have raffles, lucky dip boxes, CIKA t-shirts, ladies bags (courtesy of L'Oreal and Cosmetries), and Silent and Grand Auctions. Thanks to all of you for your generous support and the wonderful donations of goods. Thank you for coming and enjoy the night.

Following a wonderful lunch and a fun raffle, Focus launched their exciting new cookbook.



Solid Tumour Nurse Co-ordinator



ello, my name is Sonya Camilleri and I am the new solid tumour nurse coordinator. Many of you will know me as I have been part of the Haem/Onc team at the Royal Childrens Hospital for around 11 years.

I started my nursing career as a graduate nurse rotating to the Haematology/Oncology Unit (which was on 9 East in those days). My desire to specialize in paediatric oncology started at this time. What I enjoyed most was the rapport I built with children and families during and after treatment.

I began working in the Day Chemotherapy Unit in 1999. I came to realise that it is often procedures that cause more stress and concern to children than the disease itself. My focus has since been assisting children and families requiring potentially painful procedures. I have spent much time establishing and coordinating a General Anaesthetic list so children have a choice in the way some procedures are performed.

In July of this year I was given the opportunity to step into the role that Jacqui Robinson and Linda Burnett had done such a wonderful job with as the solid tumour nurse coordinators. I saw this as an opportunity to continue to work towards providing support and resources for families of children with solid tumours.

I am thoroughly enjoying my dual role as nurse coordinator as well as a clinical nurse specialist in the Day Chemotherapy Unit. I hope to continue to work closely with the Haem/Onc team and use my oncology nursing experience to assist in the care of all children and families with solid tumours.




A Story From Sue

Astory from Sue, mother of Callum, a survivor of Ewings Sarcoma.

What do you do when your supposedly healthy eleven year old sports made son is told he has cancer and may lose his leg? Well, for a start you have to keep positive for your sanity and that of your family. Try to surround yourself with "normality" Being positive was also helped by the lovely and caring doctors who Callum first saw, Peter Downie and Prof Smith who would always greet us with a smile.

Dr Downie also told me there was always hope on our first biopsy. We were also VERY lucky as Callum's cancer was contained in a bone that is dispensible -the fibula, so we all had reason to be positive about this as well

As a country family we did not establish ties with many other people in the hospital, but Callum was treated to a couple of great camps with Challenge and Camp Quality, and although he was always reluctant to go at first, he always had a ball.

Callum did not seem to have too many problems during treatment except for nausea and a couple of infections, and the time I spent with him made us very close, so this was a precious time for me as well. I remember talking to Callum's teachers at his small rural school, when he returned after his first treatment, telling them that as far as my family were concerned Callum was going to survive, and I didn't want to hear any negative talk about cancer, and he was to be treated as close to the other students as possible, with school work and homework expectations. This may sound tough but it made life a little more normal for all of us..

Callum has now been off treatment for 6 years and although he would love to be involved in football again after breaking his leg and stress fractures he finally decided he was not meant to be playing anymore!

He has some great life experiences by trekking in the Annapurna Ranges, Cradle Mountain, spending ten weeks as an exchange student in Germany and now studying at university in Melbourne. There is life after cancer, there is always hope and I am SO grateful that he is a survivor.

cancer in children and to encourage financial support to aid research into children's cancer. CIKA is an official auxiliary of the Royal Children's Hospital and is open to any interested persons who feel that they would like to contribute tom help CIKA.

Over 140 children under 15 years of age are diagnosed with cancer each year in Victoria and 90% of these children are treated at RCH. CIKA is committed to providing funding for research into solid tumours, the thied most common group of childhood cancer. Solid tumours include Wilm's tumour, Nueroblastoma, Osteosarcoma and Ewing's Sarcoma.

Apart from the influence of genetic factors, inherited conditions and exposure to ionizing radiation, little is known of the cause(s) of childhood cancers and nothing can be done to prevent them. Therefore, the need to continue the financial support of research into childhood cancer is imperative.

The hopes anddreams of CIKA are to stop children from evre contracting these types of cancer, but if they don to ensure that the treatment they receive is successful. At present the only way to move positively towards these ideals is through research.

CIKA has actively supported research projects at RCH with financial assistance since its inception and will continue to do so until these types of cancer are cured. CIKA is recognised as one of the foremost fundraising auxiliaries of the RCH, Melbourne.

The CIKA logo is in memory of the children of the families who founded CIKA. One Child liked birds, particularly seagulls, one child liked butterflies and the other liked flowers especially nasturtiums.
