





# THE MOLECULAR ONCOLOGY LABORATORY

#### **SUPPORT CIKA-Support a Cure**

Editors Note:

Since the inception of CIKA 24 years ago we have been very committed to funding research at the Royal Children's' Hospital.

Late in 2003 CIKA was made aware that there was a shortfall in funding for research at the Molecular Oncology Laboratory. At the November CIKA meeting the committee considered a presentation from Dr Elizabeth Algar, in which she presented an overview of the work being undertaken by the lab under her direction, and the funding needed to ensure its continuation in the short term. The CIKA committee agreed to fund this important work in conjunction with the Leukamia Association of the Royal Children's Hospital (LARCH). Detailed below is an overview of the research that CIKA is funding.

The Molecular Oncology Library provides a molecular diagnostic testing service to assist in the clinical management of solid tumour and leukemia patients. The aim of the laboratory is to enable paediatric cancer patients to benefit from the application of "state of the art" technologies in the management of their disease. This involves using current knowledge of the chromosomal and genetic changes that have arisen in a cancer cell to aid accurate disease diagnosis and to give an idea of disease prognosis. This information is required in order for optimal therapies to be given. Knowledge of the chromosomal or genetic changes in a cancer cell, identified at diagnosis, also provide a tool to distinguish the cancer cell from other normal cells. This is done in the laboratory using a technology known as the polymerase chain reaction or PCR, and has an especially important application in the monitoring of leukemia during therapy.

It is likely in the future that new therapies for the treatment of both solid tumors and leukemias will be based on targeting the genetic alterations that are unique to cancer cells and that are not present in normal cells. It is clear that molecular oncology, or understanding and identifying the genetic changes in cancer, will play an increasingly important role in cancer diagnosis and treatment in the future.

The head of the Molecular Oncology laboratory is Dr. Elizabeth Algar. The only salaried staff member of the laboratory, Dr. Algar has had fourteen years of post-doctoral experience in the area of paediatric cancer genetics. She is one of few people in Australia with a breadth of experience in this specialized field. In 2001 she initiated the transformation of the Molecular Oncology laboratory from a basic research laboratory into one providing both applied research and diagnostic testing for paediatric cancers and cancer syndromes. Her vision is to see the Molecular Oncology laboratory develop into a specialized laboratory providing molecular genetic testing for the paediatric cancer population in Victoria initially, and ultimately for the Australian population.

However, for its continued operation the Molecular Oncology laboratory is heavily reliant on philanthropic funds. This is particularly acute in its present phase. An enormous amount of ground work has been put in to get the laboratory to its present operational state and to apply for NATA accreditation status (which will hopefully be granted this year). Whilst the laboratory is currently supported through CIKA and LARCH at its present funding and staffing levels the laboratory cannot expand the range of tests it can offer nor improve result delivery times. In addition, the current situation limits the opportunity that Dr. Algar might otherwise have to seek new potential sources of funding. Additional staffing and financial security to enable long-term planning are desperately needed.

### Children's Cancer Centre

The Children's Cancer Centre Foundation and Royal Children's Hospital are well advanced in their plans for a new Children's Cancer Centre of Excellence at the Royal Children's Hospital.

While childhood cancer facilities in Australia are of a high standard, they are not world class. A new Children's Cancer Centre will address this and offer world-class research and treatment to our sick children.

At least \$18 million in capital funding is required to realise the Children's Cancer Centre Foundation's vision. The Victorian State Government has already recognised the critical importance of this project with a grant of \$6 million and an approach to the Federal Government is underway. Additional philanthropic support has so far raised the total income to date to approximately 50% of the \$18 million required.

The CCCF is now actively seeking funds through strategic partnerships with corporate and philanthropic Australia to help establish the new Children's Cancer Centre and advance Australia's fight against childhood cancer.

The new Centre, will occupy the 6<sup>th</sup> floor of the main hospital building (the current location of the Department) opening out in continuous space onto the same level of the new Murdoch Children's Research Institute (MCRI) Research and Development facility on the south west side of the Hospital. The new Centre will occupy a total area of 3000 square metres, some 1800 square metres larger than the current facility.

The new Cancer Centre will deliver a range of features and facilities to bring it into line with best practice and to ensure the quality of life for young cancer patients and their families by caring for their physical, psychological and social well being. It will specifically facilitate:

- Increase in the number of beds from 17 to 32,
- Best practice co-location of research and treatment facilities,
- Treatment of cancer patients in dedicated cancer wards at all times.
- A reduction in cross-infection via air filtration of the ward.
- Improved facilities for day chemotherapy and other day procedures.
- Provision for parents to stay in the room with their sick child overnight.
- Improved parent facilities, including interview and counseling rooms, kitchens, laundries, bathrooms, education services and bereavement services.

A new Children's Cancer Centre will deliver a range of benefits ultimately meaning that more children will be cured, better treatments will be developed and that the basic care of children with cancer will be improved and undertaken at all times in dedicated cancer wards.

The fit out and furnishing of the new Centre is scheduled to commence in September 2004 and conclude at the end of 2006.

### History and Aims

CIKA was founded in April 1980 by three families to increase the awareness of cancer in children and to encourage financial support to aid research into children's cancer. CIKA is an official auxiliary of the Royal Children's Hospital and is open to any interested persons who feel that they would like to contribute to help CIKA.

Over 140 children under 15 years of age are diagnosed with cancer each year in Victoria and 90% of these children are treated at RCH. CIKA is committed to providing funding for research into solid tumours, the third most common group of childhood cancer. Solid tumours include Wilm's tumour, Neuroblastoma, Osteosarcoma, and Ewing's sarcoma.

Apart from the influence of genetic factors, inherited conditions, and exposure to ionising radiation, little is known of the cause (s) of the childhood cancers and nothing can be done to prevent them. Therefore, the need to continue the financial support of research into childhood cancer is imperative.

The hopes and dreams of CIKA are to stop children from ever contracting these types of cancer, but if they do, to ensure that the treatment they receive will be successful. At present the only way to move positively towards these ideals is through Research.

CIKA has actively supported Research projects at RCH with financial assistance since its inception and will continue to do so until these types of cancer are cured. CIKA is recognized as one of the foremost fundraising auxiliaries of the Royal Children's Hospital, Melbourne.

The CIKA logo is in memory to the children of the families who founded CIKA.
